Legends of Speed Exhibit at Phoenix Museum of Art

November 3 marks the opening of Phoenix Art Museum's first major exhibition of racing cars — Legends of Speed — showcasing a selection of more than 20 cars spanning six decades and driven by some of the greatest drivers in the history of racing, including A.J. Foyt, Mario Andretti, Dan Gurney and Sir Stirling Moss.



The display will include winners of the 24 Hours of Le Mans, the Indianapolis 500 and the Italian Grand Prix; featured marques will include Maserati, Ferrari, Mercedes-Benz, Alfa Romeo, Ford and Bugatti. The museum will be the sole venue for this exhibition that runs through March 15, 2020.

Penske acquires Indy Motor Speedway and the IndyCar Series

Roger Penske's company has bought the Indianapolis Motor Speedway, the IndyCar Series and IMS productions as part of sale of Hulman & Company. So Penske will become just the fourth owner of the 110-year-old speedway.

Among the challenges he faces, per the internet buzz, are trying to increase viewership and lowering racing costs, which may attract new teams. Certainly he has the business skills. My

main concern is that he is 82 years old, what happens when he is gone?

VW to End all Factory supported Internal Combustion Powered Racing Programs



In a potential view of the future of auto racing, Volkswagen has announced it will end its factory support of all programs using internal combustion engines after implementing a motorsport strategy focused on electric mobility.

The transition to more electronic technology in the automotive industry continues, as Volkswagen said its motorsport division's "clear emphasis on fully electric racing cars" would be complemented by a "farewell" to all regular programs. Explaining the decision to adopt an electric-only strategy, Volkswagen Motorsport director Sven Smeets said motorsport could be used as a "trailblazer" for the development of electric vehicles.



Volkswagen said its ID.R electric prototype - which has set outright records at Pikes Peak, and also holds the Nurburgring Nordschleife electric record - would continue to take over the "role as a technological pioneer".

We have already seen participation of many manufacturers in the Formula E series. And even NASCAR is looking at hybrid technology.

Grand Prix Races to Stay on ESPN

Formula 1 will remain on ESPN and ABC through 2022 following the completion of a new three-year deal between the broadcaster and the world championship. And ESPN Deportes will become the exclusive Spanish-language home for all F1 races in the U.S. from 2020.

Under the new deal, all F1 races will continue to air live on either ESPN, ESPN2 or ABC and all practice sessions, qualifying and races will air live and in replay across ESPN platforms. ESPN also will continue to air the races commercial-free and will again partner with Sky Sports and Formula 1 to bring Sky Sports' presentation of Formula 1 racing to American viewers.

Ford V Ferrari Movies is a success at the Box Office!

The movie *Ford v Ferrari* opened in theaters on November 15. And surprisingly it was the top selling movie for the week, making something like \$31M. Matt Damon and Christian Bale as Carroll Shelby and Ken Miles surely helped.

I saw the movie the second weekend, on a Saturday night at the Century Downtown in Albuquerque. The showing was probably 90% sold out. My wife chose the Mr. Roberts movie on the adjacent screen, there were about 15 people there.



But how was the movie? After all the buildup I was a little disappointed. It is a dramatic movie, not a documentary but I wish it was a bit more accurate. Ford's first year in 1964 is ignored. It looks like Shelby designed the GT40 when it was really Eric Broadly of Lola. And the characters act more like movie characters than realistic people. Enzo Ferrari did not actually attend races. And there could have been a lot more racing. The last lap Daytona victory (inaccurate as Miles won the race by 8 laps) and all the bickering and posturing add drama and action so I see why they were added. The cars were mostly accurate.



Model Cars Magazine is Publishing

After several years *Model Cars* magazine has resumed publishing. Editor Gregg Hitchings has been battling health issues but is now getting the magazine out. Issue #206 will be their annual Contest issue and has recently mailed to subscribers. There have been many negative comments online about *Model Cars* but almost everything about this hobby is really a labor of love. I doubt that Greg is getting rich off subscribers money so everyone give him a break and just look forward to the new issue.



Autoweek to Cease Printed Version



After 61 years publishing a print edition of *Autoweek*, Crain Communications called it quits for the paper future of *Autoweek*. Hearst Magazines and Crain Communications struck up a deal where Hearst gets a licensing deal to continue "to operate the digital and experiential businesses of *Autoweek*."

Crain will cease publishing the print product, which was produced twice a month. But assets like online articles, e-mail newsletters and podcasts will still continue. The website, with 10M monthly page views, will be the bulk of *AutoWeek's* profitability.

Autoweek's reach in a paper medium was strong as it's ranked in the Top 10 of Car Magazines. It ranked #6 in a Top 10 listing of the largest Car Magazines by monthly circulation

reaching about 290,000 monthly subscribers. Hearst owned *Car and Driver* and *Road and Track* ranked #1 and #3 while Motor Trend Group owned *Motor Trend* and *Hot Rod Magazine* ranked #2 and #4.

Perhaps the story of why Hearst probably won't bring on a third car magazine is in *Autoweek's* readership. According to *Autoweek's* latest media packet, 73 percent of their print subscribers have been a subscriber for over 10 years. The average age of their print readership is 50 years old. Hearst Magazines saw the writing on the wall; there's no future for *Autoweek's* print editions.

It's been an illustrious run for the car magazine that started as a bi-weekly newsletter. Back in 1958 when *Autoweek* was called *Competition Press* subscribers could expect two newsletters a month on the first and third Thursday. Yearly subscriptions were just \$4 (or \$8.88 today.) In 1964, distribution matched its name and subscribers got 52 issues a year. In 2009, they halved 52 to 26 and *Autoweek* became a bi-monthly publication until its end.

It always causes me a bit of pain to see such icons fall by the wayside. As a young race fan growing up on Northwest side of Chicago, prior to the internet of course, I regularly made the long one mile hike each way to buy *Autoweek* to find out the latest racing results. That would have been in the late 60's, with Porsche starting their LeMans run, Can Am at its peak and people like Dan Gurney, Jackie Stewart and Mario Andretti being my favorite drivers.

We need to watch and see how the internet *Autoweek* develops. There was another magazine I subscribed to that covered racing on a bi-weekly basis, *On Track*, that went from print to digital early on in the internet onslaught. Their web presence lasted a very short time. They still owe me a few issues.



NuNu Platz BMW 320i DTCC 2001




NuNu Platz will be releasing a kit of the BMW 320i racer from the DTCC 2001 series.
