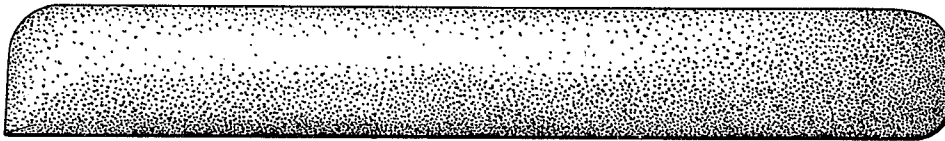

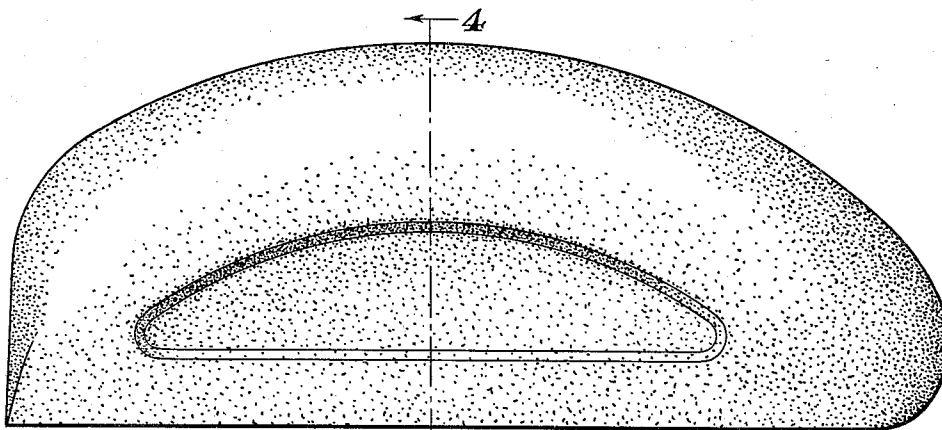

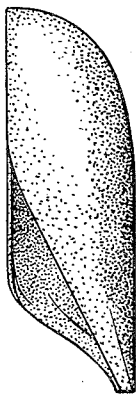

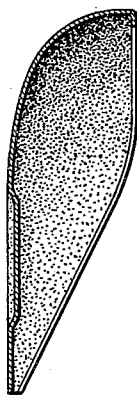

To all whom it may concern:

Be it known that I, James G. Heaslet, a citizen of the United States, residing at Hudson, in the county of Summit, State of Ohio, have invented a new, original, and ornamental Design for a Fender for Automotive Vehicles, of which the following is a specification, reference being had to the accompanying drawing, forming a part thereof.

Figure 1 is a top plan view of a fender for an automotive vehicle, embodying my new design.

Figure 2 is a side elevational view of the said fender.

Figure 3 is a front elevational view of the said fender.

Figure 4 is a sectional view taken substantially on line 4—4 Figure 2.

Figure 5 is a rear elevational view of the said fender.
